## **Letter from Bishop Erickson**

At a recent luncheon for the Interfaith Conference of Greater Milwaukee, we invited John Noltner from A Peace of My Mind to be our keynote speaker. You may recall that John worked with us in 2023, creating a slide show of images that we showed at the synod assembly. For the Interfaith Conference, he created a slide show of images of various leaders of the conference as we reflected on the question, "How does your faith tradition give you strength?" (Interfaith Conference slideshow) My response was, "When I sing with others in worship, I am often deeply moved, connecting with others to create something more beautiful than I could alone."

This sentiment is especially the case for me at this time of year, when joining with others to sing the various Advent and Christmas carols brings me a deep sense of joy, connection, and strength. So, let's sing our faith, loud and strong, and let's live our faith, boldly and fearlessly.

- Veterans who were once without homes are finding security, new skills, and renewed purpose in civilian life.



## **Steve's Science Tidbits**

#### Another Demerit for High Fructose Corn Syrup

You have probably heard that corn syrup is not very good for you, yet it is the predominant sweetener in many dietary products. Corn syrup is derived from corn starch. Starch is not very sweet, but cleave it into individual glucose molecules and you create a sweet corn syrup. And if you convert about half of those glucose molecules into fructose, you have an even sweeter high fructose corn syrup (HFCS). Sucrose, or table sugar, is a disaccharide, composed of two sugar molecules, glucose and fructose. While HFCS and sucrose are very similar in composition, corn syrup is cheaper and for financial reasons is the preferred sweetener in many highly processed foods.

Fructose is the natural sugar found in fruits as well as some vegetables and when consumed from these natural sources is not thought to be harmful to a person's health. Highly processed foods have hit the national spotlight recently as a major contributor to the national health problem, and because they often contain HFCS, it has prompted many studies on the potential harmful effects of so much fructose consumption.

Past studies have linked dietary fructose with many conditions such as Alzheimer's disease, type 2 diabetes, fatty liver disease, kidney disease and cancer. While consumption of foods sweetened with table sugar has also been implicated, in the past four to five decades the use of fructose as an artificial sweetener has exploded so that consumers are exposed to much higher levels than ever before.

It has been known for over a century that cancer cells are addicted to glucose. If radioactive glucose tracer is administered to a patient, because cancer cells take up more sugar than healthy cells, any cancer will light up on a PET (positron emission tomography) scan. A recent study at Washington University (St. Louis) tested the hypothesis that fructose sweeteners could mediate a proposed cancer-inducing action of processed foods.

The research group found that the body's liver converts fructose into a lipid called lysophosphatidylcholine (LPC), an important component of cell membranes. The liver releases this lipid into the bloodstream where it travels throughout the body to reach potential tumor sites. For a cancer cell to divide into two it must make a new set of cell contents, including a tremendous amount of new cell membrane. This requires an influx of nutrients that must ultimately come from the diet. And it isn't much of a stretch to suggest that an increase of dietary fructose converted to LPC in the liver would have a serious growth-promoting effect on cancers that appear in the body.

One of the study's authors concluded: "This is one of the few studies that provides a possible mechanism for fructose, which is found in corn syrup, processed food, and sweeteners, a mechanism that may cause a variety of different cancers...people need to be very cautious about using sweeteners or using sugars that are not from fruits and vegetables, but are in processed foods."
