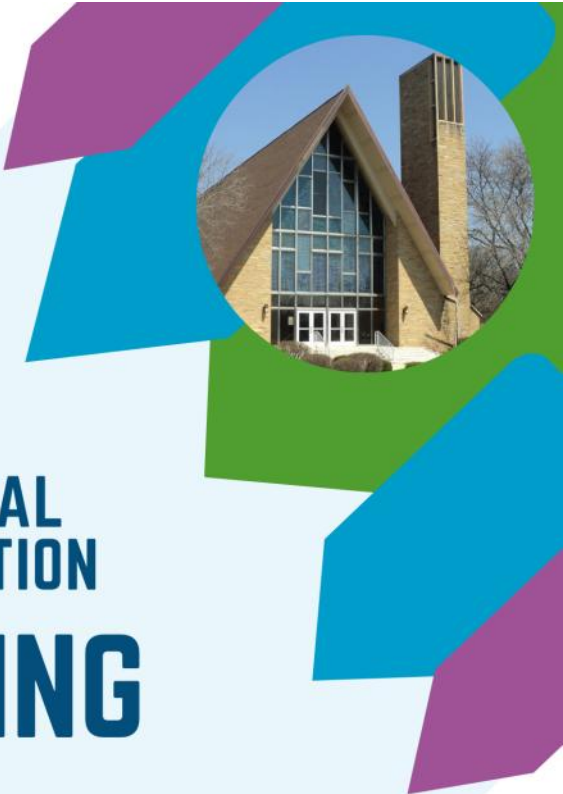

On the Shooting in Minneapolis



*Learn to do good; seek justice;
rescue the oppressed;
defend the orphan;
plead for the widow. (Isaiah 1:17).*

Alongside our siblings in Christ in Minneapolis and throughout Minnesota and all who have been impacted by aggressive immigration enforcement and violence by federal law enforcement agents, I mourn the shocking shooting death of Renee Nicole Good by an Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agent on Jan. 7, 2026. I join calls for a thorough investigation into this case, accountability for the shooting and a de-escalation of ICE enforcement across the United States. Alongside the Lutherans who have held vigils in Minneapolis and around the country, our church prays for God's peace in this community and justice in this case.

The ELCA is committed to upholding and guaranteeing basic human rights for the safety of migrants and their families. Our church works toward just and humane policies affecting migrants in and outside the United States. We decry language that dehumanizes immigrants who are beloved children of God and escalates tensions between federal agents and communities. Surges of immigration enforcement and violent encounters like we are seeing in Minneapolis — as well as in Chicago; Atlanta; Los Angeles; Portland, Ore.; and Washington, D.C.— have indiscriminately targeted our neighbors, creating fear and uncertainty. This has created conditions where immigrants, those accompanying them and federal agents are all at risk.

ELCA social teaching provides guidance in complex situations: “Public safety depends upon trust in law enforcement to respect and protect the rights of all” (“[Gun-related Violence and Trauma](#)”). As a church, we are concerned by the trend of law enforcement and federal agents involved in immigration enforcement relying on the use of force in our communities without sufficient accountability or oversight.

God calls us to be witnesses to God's presence, healing and hope. I invite ongoing prayers, vigils and advocacy for peace and justice, and I affirm the ELCA's “pledge to continue our church's historic leadership in caring for refugees and immigrants” ([For Peace in God's World](#)).

This event is open to all and you'll have a chance to:

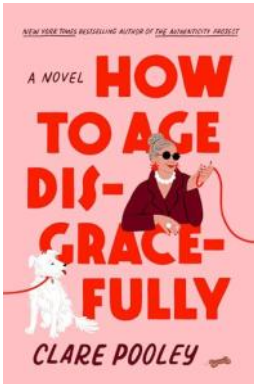

Steve's Science Tidbits

The Tragic Story of Parkinson's Disease

Parkinson's Disease is a terrible affliction, involving progressive loss of motor control due to the death of dopamine-producing neurons in the brain. Symptoms include tremors, stiffness, slowed movement and balance issues. A good friend and colleague of mine at Marquette succumbed to this disease three years ago, and just this past year my beloved mentor from grad school at the University of Iowa suffered the same fate. It is heart-wrenching to witness the gradual bodily deterioration that typifies this disease.

When the human genome project was launched in 1990, the goal was to determine every human gene, and this amazing feat was achieved within ten years. It was thought that unraveling our genome would revolutionize the diagnosis, prevention, and treatment of most, if not all, human diseases. As a result, much of the funding of the epidemiology of Parkinson's has centered on genetics as a primary causal agent instead of environmental factors.

However, interesting data have accumulated. One study showed that identical twins develop Parkinson's with the same frequency as fraternal twins, casting doubt on a Parkinson's gene (because fraternal twins do not have the same genes).

You may remember those late night TV ads asking the viewer if they knew someone stationed at Camp Lejeune marine base in North Carolina who suffered from serious medical issues. Turns out a chemical contaminant, trichloroethylene (TCE), leached into the water table and soldiers were inhaling toxic fumes every time they turned on the tap; cases of Parkinson's skyrocketed there (as well as many cancers). An enterprising researcher compared that situation with Camp Pendleton in California, where there was no contamination issue. Camp Lejeune had a stunning 70% greater incidence of Parkinson's cases than Camp Pendleton.

Then an incredible Parkinson's patient appeared. He was a drug addict who had perfect motor control until he injected an illegal drug; two days later he was mute and unable to move. The doctors were perplexed at this sudden turn of events, but further examination revealed he had full-blown Parkinson's. What normally took years to develop had taken only two days!

The patient thought he had injected a designer drug called MPPP, but scientists discovered the amateur chemist that produced it had erred in his methodology, creating instead an alternative molecule called MPTP. When investigators secured a batch of MPTP and tested it on non-human primates, the drug destroyed their dopamine-producing neurons, and the monkeys quickly developed all the classical signs of Parkinson's.

Further damning evidence appeared when it was shown that paraquat, a chemical herbicide, had a chemical structure very similar to MPTP. Additional sleuthing showed that farmers who sprayed paraquat on their crops had a shockingly high rate of Parkinson's.

Recent work in mice has confirmed that TCE destroys their dopamine neurons and produces serious motor issues. The evidence appears overwhelming that, while genetics explain a low percentage of Parkinson's cases, environmental toxins may, indeed, be the main culprit. How many of these chemicals are people unknowingly exposed to?! **Steve Downs**
